PHYSICAL CONDITION AND AGE

A PERSON'S PHYSICAL FITNESS, HEALTH STATUS, AND AGE PLAY A SIGNIFICANT ROLE IN DROWNING SURVIVAL TIME. YOUNGER

CHILDREN AND ELDERLY INDIVIDUALS OFTEN HAVE LESS PHYSICAL STRENGTH AND STAMINA, REDUCING THEIR ABILITY TO STAY AFLOAT. CHRONIC MEDICAL CONDITIONS, SUCH AS HEART DISEASE OR RESPIRATORY DISORDERS, ALSO DECREASE SURVIVAL CHANCES.

SWIMMING ABILITY AND EXPERIENCE

STRONG SWIMMERS AND THOSE WITH WATER SURVIVAL TRAINING TYPICALLY HAVE LONGER SURVIVAL TIMES. THEY CAN TREAD WATER, FLOAT, AND USE ENERGY-SAVING TECHNIQUES TO DELAY EXHAUSTION AND INHALATION OF WATER. INEXPERIENCED OR PANICKED INDIVIDUALS MAY TIRE QUICKLY AND SUCCUMB TO DROWNING FASTER.

SAFETY EQUIPMENT AND ENVIRONMENTAL FACTORS

THE PRESENCE OF LIFE JACKETS, FLOTATION DEVICES, AND IMMEDIATE RESCUE RESOURCES CAN INCREASE DROWNING SURVIVAL TIME. ENVIRONMENTAL FACTORS SUCH AS CURRENTS, WAVES, AND VISIBILITY ALSO INFLUENCE OUTCOMES, WITH ROUGH CONDITIONS SHORTENING THE WINDOW FOR SURVIVAL.

BIOLOGICAL PROCESSES DURING DROWNING

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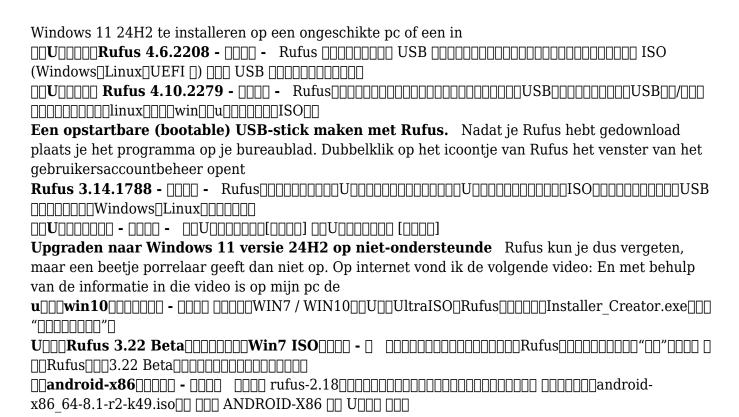
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
