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OVERVIEW OF HIGH SCHOOL ECONOMICS CURRICULUM IN CALIFORNIA

THE HIGH SCHOOL ECONOMICS CURRICULUM IN CALIFORNIA IS DESIGNED TO PROVIDE STUDENTS WITH FOUNDATIONAL KNOWLEDGE ABOUT ECONOMIC PRINCIPLES, FINANCIAL LITERACY, AND THE IMPACT OF ECONOMICS ON SOCIETY. CALIFORNIA STATE STANDARDS AND GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

STATE-MANDATED ECONOMICS COURSE

IN CALIFORNIA, COMPLETION OF AN ECONOMICS COURSE IS A GRADUATION REQUIREMENT FOR ALL PUBLIC HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS. THIS MANDATE IS OUTLINED IN THE CALIFORNIA EDUCATION CODE, WHICH SPECIFIES THAT STUDENTS MUST COMPLETE ONE SEMESTER OF ECONOMICS AS PART OF THE SOCIAL SCIENCE REQUIREMENT. MICROECONOMICS CONCEPTS
